The Jerusalem Council

Acts 15

STORY POINT: SALVATION COMES ONLY THROUGH FAITH IN JESUS.

Paul and Barnabas had been sharing the gospel with many people—including Gentiles. But some people in the church began to teach that the Gentiles could not be saved unless they first followed some of the same rules the Jews followed.

Paul and Barnabas disagreed, and the church leaders decided to meet in Jerusalem to talk. After a long discussion, Peter stood up and said to the group, "Brothers, God chose me to tell the good news to the Gentiles. They heard the good news, and they believed. God accepted them and gave them the Holy Spirit, just as He did for us.

"We believe that the Jews and Gentiles are saved in the same way—by the grace of the Lord Jesus.

"I think we should not cause trouble for the Gentiles who have trusted in Jesus. Instead, let's write them a letter telling them the things they should not do."

So the church leaders wrote a letter to the Gentile believers. The leaders chose Judas and Silas to go to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas to deliver the letter. Paul and Barnabas stayed in Antioch where they taught believers and told other people the good news about Jesus.

Paul's Second Journey

Acts 15-18

STORY POINT: PAUL AND SILAS PLANTED NEW CHURCHES.

One night, God told Paul in a vision to go to Macedonia to share the gospel there. A servant girl had a spirit in her that allowed her to predict the future. The girl followed Paul and Silas, shouting, "These men are servants of the Most High God!" Finally, Paul turned and said to the spirit in her, "By the power of Jesus,

I command you to come out!" And the spirit came out right away.

Now the girl's owners were upset

because she could no longer tell the future. The officials put Paul and Silas in jail.

About midnight, a violent

About midnight, a violent earthquake shook the jail. The jailer woke up and thought the prisoners had escaped, so he took out his sword and was about to kill himself.

"Don't hurt yourself!" Paul said. "We are all here!"

The jailer took Paul and Silas outside. "Men, what must I do to be saved?" he asked.

They said, "Believe in the Lord Jesus and you will be saved."

When Paul got to Athens, he was upset that the people there did not worship the one true God. Paul told the people about the one true God. Paul also said that God wants everyone in the world to repent, to turn away from their sin and turn to Him.

When the people heard about Jesus being raised from the dead, some of them laughed; however, some people believed in Jesus.

Christ Connection: Lydia, the jailer, and many others were saved because they heard the gospel and believed in Jesus. Paul and Silas preached the same message to all people, no matter who they were: "Believe in the Lord Jesus and you will be saved."

No Other Gospel

Galatians 1-3

STORY POINT: BELIEVERS ARE SAVED AND GROW IN GODLINESS BY FAITH IN JESUS.

The Galatian Christians had believed the gospel Paul preached to them, but false teachers had come preaching a different message, and the Galatians started to believe those lies!

The false teachers taught that to be saved, a person needed more than just faith in Jesus. They said you had to obey the law of Moses too. Paul wrote them a letter to stop their confusion.

Paul said that God will punish anyone who comes preaching a different message than the gospel He gave us through His Son, Jesus.

Paul reminded the Galatians of what God had done for him. Jesus appeared to Paul and called him to preach the gospel to the Gentiles. Paul knew the gospel: Jesus came into the world to save sinners. This good news is for Jews and Gentiles, and Jesus is all they need.


Paul told the Galatians they were foolish. Paul wanted to make this clear: Every believer becomes a Christian by faith in Jesus. No one can be saved by the law.

Paul traveled to the city of Thessalonica. Paul told the people the good news about Jesus, and many people believed in Jesus. Some people did not like Paul or his teachings and they forced him out of the city.

Paul worried about the people in Thessalonica. They had not been believers for very long. So Paul sent his friend Timothy to see how they were doing. Timothy brought back good news. Even though the Thessalonians faced suffering for their faith, they did not give up.


Paul wrote a letter to encourage the believers. He told them that Jesus will return someday. On that day, Paul said, believers will no longer suffer! This message gave them great hope.

Paul wrote to help the believers in Thessalonica know what is true.

No one knows when Jesus will come again. The Day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night, when you do not expect it. Whether we are alive or dead when Jesus returns, He will bring us all home with Him forever. So continue to encourage each other because we have this future hope.

Christ Connection: The prophets in the Old Testament told about the Day of the Lord, a day when God would come to judge the world and save His people. Paul said that in the future, on the Day of the Lord, Jesus will return for His people and judge the wicked. Believers live with hope, knowing that Jesus will come again.
